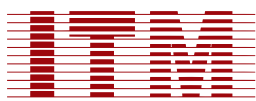

Ringling Bells Freedom 251- Worth or Waste?

SMARTPHONES, the only tool that helps covering the distance between one place to another and equally an important source of information & education; ringing bells, the Noida based company kept these factors in mind, launched FREEDOM 251 smartphone with a price tag of INR 251 that increased the size of the eye and the ear of every reader & listener.

It aimed to empower DIGITAL INDIA campaign started by PM Narendra Modi who believes that the information and technology would play a serious role in pushing India towards a better tomorrow & as a part of this campaign the government wants to ensure that every citizen should have a smartphone by 2019. The main objective of Freedom 251 is to make smartphone technology available to the rural areas and poor, so that it gives a push to digital empowerment.

Mohit Goyal, engineer from Amity University, is a 28-year-old guy from Garhi Pukhta, a small town in Uttar Pradesh, is behind the idea of FREEDOM 251. The most important area that is aimed with this initiative is to use e-governance facilities available for Indian citizens which will increase the transparency automatically and make the government accountable. Agriculture, being the most important sector of our economy; the phone has apps which will keep the farmers updated on rates, demands and modern techniques of farming. Similarly for healthcare, the app provides us information about health-related schemes. It also comes with an app for women safety which will be achieved as all the women will be able to afford this smartphone.

The 3G handset Freedom 251, features a 4-inch display, Qualcomm 1.3 GHz quad-core processor and 1 GB RAM. The Android Lollipop-based handset will have an onboard of 8 GB with support for expandable memory of up to 32 GB. It features a 3.2 MP rear and a 0.3 MP front facing camera and a 1,450- mAh battery. The mass market device comes with

preinstalled apps including women safety, Swachh Bharat, Fisherman, Farmer, Medical, WhatsApp, Facebook and YouTube.

But with such a low-priced smartphone there arises a lot of questions:

- If the screen alone of the smartphone costs more than INR 500 then how can a phone cost just INR 251?
- There are claims that the cheapest phone would cost approximately INR 2,700 but how can someone make a phone for just INR 251?
- The rumors say that the actual phone has not yet been manufactured
- What is the company trying to do with people? How is the company going to meet the expectations people have?

Upbeating And Refreshing:- Latest Absurdity Of Jat Reservation

They assessed the situations of socially backward classes. The commission used the 1930 census data and further added 1,217 communities as backward and estimated the population to 52%. By the time of 2006 the number went up to 2,297 which was an increase of 60% from the list prepared by the Mandal commission.

Background of Jats

Jats are an agricultural group predominantly in Haryana and seven other states in North India currently demanding reservation in government jobs and educational institutions under OBC category.

Demand for Reservation

Entrepreneurship- A Leading Strategy

Most organizations find that their ability to identify and innovatively exploit opportunities decreases as they move from the entrepreneurial to the growth phase. However, the key to success in the highly competitive and dynamic environment that most companies presently operate in is to retain this ability. Therefore, companies need to adopt an entrepreneurial strategy- seeking competitive advantage through continuous innovation to effectively exploit identified opportunities- in order to sustain and grow under such circumstances. For such a strategy to succeed, companies should develop an enabling economic and political ecosystem that does not impede small or large scale redeployment of resources in new ways towards creative, entrepreneurial ends. Companies have a range of options to

choose from to achieve this objective. At the one end of this option spectrum is focused entrepreneurship where in the other end is a managerial approach that leads to the creation of 'organization wide entrepreneurship'. Entrepreneurship in such organizations is a shared value and drives managerial Behaviour in conscious and subconscious ways and creates an entrepreneurial spirit organization wide.

Many mature organizations unwilling to alter the status quo, tend to create focused initiatives that are mandated to identify and exploit new opportunities. While such focused initiatives may stimulate innovation, the very nature of their design erects barriers between the existing organization and the innovation effort. This makes it difficult for the organizations to access and leverage the existing capability base and to integrate new initiatives back into operational activity. Companies intent on developing and preserving entrepreneurship organization-wide, independent of the stage of growth, create an environment in which those who believe in the attractiveness of opportunities feel encouraged to pursue them. The top managements of such companies will design an organization context conducive to autonomous generation of entrepreneurial initiatives, provide a sense of overall direction to these initiatives, and ensure that promising ventures receive necessary resource as they move through the uncertain development process wherein: $\frac{3}{4}$ money is neither offered nor seen as a primary motivator $\frac{3}{4}$ entrepreneurial contributions are rewarded with recognition and through provision of opportunities to engage in entrepreneurial activities on a bigger scale $\frac{3}{4}$ failure is considered normal and when failure occurs, the focus is on problem solving and learning from it rather than apportioning blame $\frac{3}{4}$ appropriate processes are used to capture knowledge created in the innovation process and routines developed to enable integration of such knowledge to create organizational rents The contrast between patterns of focused and organization-wide entrepreneurship runs across every element of the organization starting with its mission and covering strategy, structure, systems, processes and people skills and attitude. Institutionalizing the elements of entrepreneurship is crucial to building a sustaining competitive organization in today's business environment.

Social Entrepreneurship- A Booming Branch

NGOs are an integral part of the present day organizational landscape. They are preserved to be much better than government and for profit businesses in delivering the social welfare goods and services needed by society. Policy makers in India and the world over are showing an increasing preference for NGOs to implement various social welfare programs. The NGO organization differs from public bureaucracies and for-profit businesses based on the two criteria of non-government ness and non-profitness. Various advantages like ability to attract altruistic resources, to provide for unmet and heterogeneous demand for public goods, protection against contract failure, and free-rider problem are attributed to these two defining features of NGOs. They are also seen as sites that facilitate socialization in democratic participation, social innovation and responsiveness. When examined in the socio-historical backdrop of the Indian NGO sector, each of these advantages while having relevance historically is being severely compromised in recent times. The shift in voluntarism from a calling to a paid employment, institutionalization of funding sources, deployment of hard contracting and other developments in the NGO sector have dampened the perceived advantages. Altruism is more likely an involuntary subsidization and NGOs are more and more becoming mass producers of welfare goods. The focus on clear, well planned project proposals and documents and clearly specified procedures and budgets have reduced the elbow room available to NGOs to innovate. This loss of relevance is primarily because the organic features to the organizational form which bestowed some of the advantages on NGOs are now being traded off in favor of a more standardized approach. Formalized form that is Scalable and monitorable. Yet, because of the preferences of the institutionalized funders, non- profit lessness continues to remain a defining feature of NGOs even though it may not be giving the organization a competitive advantage over public bureaucracies or for-profit businesses. On the Contrary, the constraint on profits has resulted in NGOs adopting practices which expose them to Criticism. These practices, while being perfectly rational for other kinds of organizations, become Contortions in the case of NGOs. It is therefore necessary for us to re-examine the nature of NGOs and assess the role played by the non-profit constraint and come up with appropriate mechanisms.

Charlie Hebdo:- Satire Shot Dead

It was the sort of attack that the French government has declared for several months- Charlie Hebdo: Satire shot dead. The assailants didn't make the choice randomly. Charlie Hebdo, with full conviction, has been airing free speech, mocking religion as well as politics. Be it Catholicism or Islam, ethnicity or person, none has been spared from their light hearted and humorous depictions, which made the newspaper an important example of freedom of the pass. Though it originated in the year 1960 as Hara- Kiri & was renamed as the current in 1970 so as to avoid the iterative bans. It follows prolonged history but the mess begins with the year 2006 when a cartoon that caricatured the Islamic prophet Muhammad in a series of 12 pictures was republished, one in which Muhammad has a turban with burning fuse over his head creating controversy & raging ferocity all over the world. Ever since then their office & the cartoonists are danger prone & were placed under police

immunity. But sadly, the defense couldn't stop two gunmen, armed with weapons, from shooting & killing 10 cartoonists including Charb, the editor & best-known cartoonist along with a policeman in Jan, 2015. The shooters reportedly yelled "Allahu Akbar" ("God is greatest") during the assault and "We have avenged the prophet" as they sped out of the office. On Jan 11, millions of people plus 40 world leaders became a part of a rally of national unity in Paris followed by demonstrations across France. Now what sounds like an ironic joke is that French authorities jailed a youth for posting a picture of a person holding Charlie Hebdo Magazine, being hit by bullets, on Facebook. Where does the "freedom of speech" vanish now? That too in a country that has elicited too much criticism from human rights organizations. This depicts nothing but the hypocrisy of Frances' political status.

Are Engineers Bound to Just IT Firms?

Of the six hundred thousand engineers that graduate annually in the country, only 18.43% are employable for the software engineer services role and 7.49% are employable for jobs, even though more than 90% aspire for such jobs. In contrast, 53% engineers have a software role as the most preferred job, whereas 44 % prefer core engineering jobs. This means 97% engineers want jobs either in software or core engineering. There is a large mismatch in the aspirations of graduating engineers and their job readiness, which can create large-scale dissatisfaction and disillusionment, says Aspiring Minds, an employability Solutions company in its third edition of National Employability Report (NER). The report adds that employability varies tremendously across colleges. For instance, colleges in Tier 1 cities have 18.26% employable software engineers, whereas for those in Tier 2 cities, it goes down to 14.17%. Similarly, the states at the top have employability as high as 40.42%; those at the bottom have it at 12.03%. "Despite this variation we find that 53% of employable candidates for IT services companies and 25% of employable candidates for IT product companies are studying beyond the top 750 colleges, and thus end up being invisible to most employers. This signals that potentially a large proportion of employable engineers are ending up without any opportunity-a dangerous trend for higher education," said Himanshu Agarwal CEO and Director Aspiring Minds. A key reason behind these employability percentages is inadequate preparation in the domain area, i.e. the ability to apply basic principles of say, computer engineering or mechanical engineering to Real world problems. 91.82% computer/ IT

Engineers and 60% engineers from other engineering branches fall short of the desired domain knowledge required for such roles. These concepts and principles are there in college curriculum, however there is a gap in teaching and learning pedagogy being followed in the majority of colleges. The report is based on a sample of over 120000 engineering students from 520 plus engineering colleges across India. All the candidates graduated in 2013. The analysis and findings of the report is based on the result of the students on Aspiring Minds' Computer Adaptive Test, a standardized employability test. More than 550 companies, including six of top 10 IT services companies in India use AMCAT for their assessment and recruitment solutions. To add to the unemployability woes, only around 6% of the engineers have startup companies as their first job preference. "If we consider those who are both employable and Aspire to work with startups, the number decreases to 1.9%. Hence startup companies shall have a very hard time attracting and hiring students for their organization.

Whereas males and females equally prefer working in a Startups, students from colleges and lower tier Cities prefer startups even less (4%), considering the current entry level hiring practices, where companies only Vijay certain high ranking colleges for their hiring program A candidate from a tier 3 college with equal merit as a Tier 1 student, has 24% lower odds to get a job. If the student from a tier 3 college gets a job, he or she will get Rs 66000 per annum less than a student of equal merit from a Tier 1 college implying that a tier 3 college student is necessarily disadvantaged, even though he has equal proficiency and employability.

MP07 – The Historical Destination

“When you are new to the city you dislike it's crippled ability But when you spend some time around, it grows on you and love is found.”

The sweet morning breeze was filling the room, the red rays of the sun were pushing themselves inside the window and I was still absorbed in dreams. Suddenly someone yelled. “Subah ho gayimamu!! And guess what it was my FM radio. While I was trying to hit the off button, my heart was convincing me to sleep, but suddenly my mind shouted, “Good Morning Gwalior " ... it was like Vidya Balan yelling from the FM house!!!

Last night I was jotting down some facts about Gwalior that have always filled every tourist with delight, ecstasy. I hope it will extend your dimensions of knowledge and love for the city too.

Gwalior, where an empire rose and fell before the dawn of history; where citadels of emperors are still in existence; a city of mysterious eternity whose old ruins proclaim a majestic and imperial past and whose present pulsates vibrantly with the every flowing life of India.

From legendary history which begins from 6th century when adorable Gwalior fort founded its roots and transformation of this barren land of Gopadri to Gwalior, the city became the cradle of great dynasties, and with each it gained a new dimension from the warrior kings, poets, musicians and saints who contributed to make it renowned throughout the country.

Though the pace of development is exactly the same as the speed of the train which runs on the world's longest narrow gauge from Gwalior to Shyampurkala. But one can proudly say that “slow and steady wins the race”. after having a full panoramic view of the historical city. The old 'Havelis' and edifices from the past are still standing silently on the land or Rishi Galav, but their science also speaks about their owners and people who lived here centuries back.

Historically and architecturally, Gwalior is simply impeccable; first as a very ancient city of Jainism. Second for its example of palace architecture of the best Hindu period (1486 – 1516); and third as an historic fortress. The massive Gwalior fort, popularly called “the Gibraltar of India”, overlooks the city. This fort's architecture is uniquely a Chinese influence on Indian architecture. “The pearl in the necklace of the forts of Hind”, described by Babur.

Standing on the steep mass of sandstone, Gwalior fort dominates the city and is its most significant monument. The magnificent outer walls of the fort still stand, two miles in length and 35 feet high, bearing witness to its reputation for being one of most invincible forts of India.

There's a captivating story about how the fort of Gwalior came into existence, there was a king named Surajsen who suffered from leprosy. He did worship of the sun to get healed from his

sickness and he did. After that he built the fort of Gwalior. There's a kund (reservoir) named after him in the fort, called Surajkund. In fact, there's plenty of water at the top of the fort, there are many water tanks which never dry up and are always filled with water even though there is no apparent source of water to them.

Gwalior fort also occupies a unique place in the human civilization as the place which has the first ever recorded use of zero. Also referred as 'Shunya' in Sanskrit, this site is of mathematical interest because of what is written on a tablet recording the establishment of a small 9th century Hindu temple on the eastern side of the plateau. By accident, it records the oldest '0' in India for which a definite date can be assigned.

The name of the fort is also linked to the practice of Sati at the 'Jauharkund palace', Sati was performed by the womenfolk of the royal family when the king of Gwalior was defeated in the year 1232 AD.

Situated on the mountain area at slopes of Gwalior fort are the unique statues of Jain tirthankaras and Gopachal Parvat.

The largest idol of Lord Parashwanath on Lotus is the largest statue (in single stone piece) in the world, being 47 feet high and 30 feet in width. Gurudwara, "Data Bandi Chor" (God, please free the prisoners.) is also built here in the memory of Guru Har Gobind Sahib, the 6th Sikh Guru who was imprisoned here by Emperor Jehangir for over two years. The charm of the fortress can be compared to the beauty of Mrignayanee, famous Gujjar princess. Gujari Mahal is present at the second entrance of the fort constructed on her demand by Emperor Maan Singh Tomar, whose place itself has a tantalizing architecture.

Gwalior is a historic city, where each ancient building has an interesting and intriguing story behind it. Like the one behind the logo of Scindias; The Mughal emperor Akbar is also known to have organized hunting parties near Gwalior. They used to start their journey from the fort itself and collect at a place, nowadays known as "PhoolBagh". PhoolBagh is also famous for having a temple, Mosque, church and Gurudwara, in a close vicinity. Here the king and his soldiers used to hire the horses and usually ride them to the next destination, "Padav". Padav is basically a Hindi word given to the last stoppage of the journey!! Then again the king with his soldiers used to race along the way, the road is now named as "Race Course Road" and after praying at the temple now-a-days famous as "Gola ka Mandir", they finally rode the horses to their destination that is the outer periphery of Gwalior which was once a big jungle namely "Maharajpura", the place where Maharaja (king) visited often!!

Credited as 'The land of music', where once lived Mian Tansen one of the 'nice jewels' of Akbar's court, Gwalior is not only historically developed, but the India's largest trade fair commonly known as "Gwalior Vyaparmela" is organized every year during the winters. Not only this, every year a national level music festival is also organized in November/December near the Tansen's tomb. Musicians and singers

from all over India come here to perform in the Music fest which is telecasted live on Door darshan.

Apart from the fabulous fort, there's a splendor of a different kind existing in the Jai Vilas Palace, current residence of the Scindia family. Jai Vilas is an Italianate structure which combines the Tuscan and Corinthian architectural modes. The imposing Durbar Hall has two central chandeliers weighing a couple of tones, and was hung only after ten elephants had tested the strength of the roof. Ceilings picked out on the roof, heavy draperies and tapestries, fine Furniture carpets and antique furniture from France and Italy are the features of its spacious room. Eye catching treasures include; a silver train with cut glass wagons as it chugged around the rabble on miniature rails; a glass cradle from Italy used for the baby Krishna each Janamashtami, silver dinner services and swords that were once worn by Aurangzed and Shah Jahan. These are, besides, personal mementoes of past members of the Scindia family; the jeweled slippers that belonged to Chinkoo Rani, four-poster beds, gifts from practically every country in the world, hunting trophies and portraits. The Scindia museum offers an unparalleled glimpse into the rich culture and lifestyle of princely India.

Jayaji Chowk is the central focus of Lashkar, with a large square, a former opera house, banks, tea, coffee and juice stands and a municipal market building. Thriving bazaars surround the chowk. Many jewelry shops are situated near the Jiwaji Chowk aka MaharaBada. Numerous ancient structures of diverse styles such as Chinese, Italian, Mughal, Russian, Rajputi, make this sport exquisite and different from the other sports.

The ultimate transport service of this ancient city is 'Tempo'. Yes those old 3 wheeler rickshaws which were once used by kings when they used to go for family visits. You can hire one such vehicle to visit each attraction of the city including the Bahadura sweets. It is a shop for its especially delicious 'BoondhiLadoo'; Shri Atal Bihari Vajpayee, former prime minister of India and son of the city, once described these laddoos as, "One boondiladoo a day keeps my doctor away!!".

Modern Gwalior has a charming mix of old and new worlds. On one side you can see old architectural sites, buzzing streets and exotic markets, and on the other side, Gwalior has magnificent malls, educational universities, modern opulent high-rise buildings and lots of greenery. Keeping alive the culture and customs of the ancient city, the "Gwalior Gharana" is one side refreshing the spirit of music, and on the other side the youth is busy converting the city to "Education Empire" of Madhya Pradesh. There is a log of Gwalior still undiscovered and still unknown..... summing up with some lines

"One day the doctors may suggest this cure,
A week in Gwalior, the remedy for sure.
Surrender to this city making overtures,
And there is no remedy for love but to love more!"

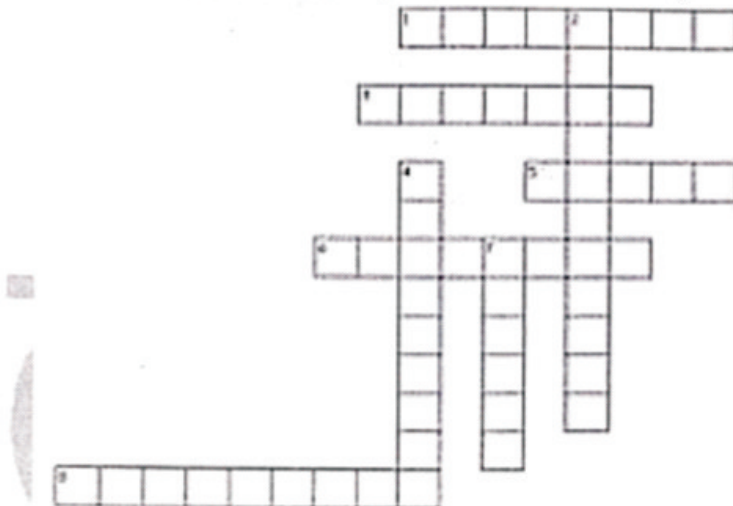

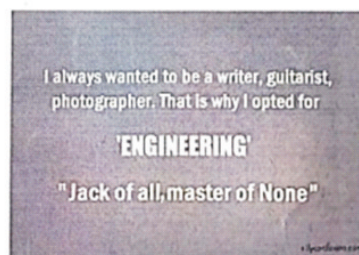
